A. THE COLLEGE

I. Location

The Nabinchandra College (NC. College) Badarpur is situated in the heart of Badarpur, historically an important town in Karimganj district of South Assam. Badarpur, being located in the centre of Barak valley and also being the meeting point of Cachar, Hailakandi and Karimganj districts, enjoys an enviable location in this valley. Besides, it is the gateway to Barak Valley and is well connected with the three lifelines of this valley, namely rail, road and river. The heart enchanting hills of Panchgram, the distant blue hills of Meghalaya, the ever green surroundings with trees in bloom, paddy fields, ponds and a busy national highway in front have lent an idyllic view and provided urban facilities at the same time.

II. History

The beautiful and well-built Nabinchandra College that stands impressively in the heart of Badarpur town had its beginning in the late 1960s. The people of those years faced many a problem in sending their children for higher education to Karimganj or Silchar as there was no college between these two towns lying fifty-five kilometres apart. Distance, wastage of time and money, poor communication facilities were the chief hurdles which made them think about an alternative arrangement. The result was the unanimous decision of setting up a college at Badarpur. This noble idea soon acquired flesh and bones through the selfless and untiring efforts of the people of all walks of life in the form of a college on August 2 1969. The sweat and blood of the then staff, students and the general public helped in laying a strong foundation and in nurturing the new born educational institution.

As the college had no campus of its own, the classes of only Arts stream were run in a rented building, very close to the present site. The college was christened "Nabinchandra College" in 1971 after the late father of Basanta Kumar Das, a major donor from Karimganj town. It was shifted to the present site in 1974 and was brought under the deficit system of grants-in-aid rules of the Assam government in 1975. Since then it never looked back and always marched forward, crossing many a hurdle on the road to progress, achieving side by side the physical development of the college and the academic growth of the institution.

The College introduced **Commerce Stream** at H.S. level in 1981 and at degree level in 1984, which continued till 1989. After a gap of six years, the College re-introduced the Commerce Stream in 1996. At present It is a full fledged vibrant stream with core and honours courses as well as value added courses.

In the session 2006-07, the college introduced Science Stream at degree level and in 2008-09 at the H.S. level. At present the science stream has emerged as a full fledged vibrant stream with honours courses in Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology and Ecology & Environmental Science.

Apart from this, NC. College, Badarpur is one of the five colleges of Assam and the only college under Assam University selected by DHE, Assam, to offer Bachelor Degree in Vocational Course (B. Voc) in Information Technology w.e.f the session 2017-18

The college is a an Examination Zone of Assam University, Silchar, for Under Graduate Courses and has been working successfully since the session 2014-15.

The College has recognised the need to introduce Career oriented programmes at U.G. Level and accordingly has introduced in 2004-05 a course in **Functional Arabic** sponsored by NCPUL, under H.R.D Ministry, New Delhi. In 2006-07 Session, the college has introduced U.G.C. sponsored Career Oriented programmes in **Computer Application in Business, Marketing Management and Entrepreneurship Development**. A correspondence course centre under the Institute of Distance and Open learning (IDOL) of Gauhati University had functioned in this college for many years. The College also joined as a Partner Institute of Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) under its convergence scheme to offer different conventional and specialised courses to the aspirants of Badarpur and adjacent areas which worked for many years successfully. However, the same is not working presently due to general decision of IGNOU.

Over the years, the college has made significant progress on academic front— diversification of subjects and streams, increase in the intake capacity of the students, increase in the number of faculty members, upgrading the library facilities, laboratory facilities, auditorium, conference hall, smart class rooms along with considerable improvement in infrastructure and teaching-learning process.

III. Vision and Mission:

The college has set the following vision and mission :

1. Impart quality education to the learners in different branches of Arts, Commerce, Science & B. Voc
2. Disseminate knowledge to the youth irrespective of caste, creed, race, sex and religion.
3. Inspire and promote the education of the local youth particularly women and backward classes.
4. Promote physical, mental and moral growth of the youth with human values in order to enable them to face the complex challenges of life.
5. Foster the spirit of liberal humanism, tolerance, national integration, brotherhood and fellow feelings among the students in particular and the society in general, and to do all such things as may be conducive to the welfare of the students and the community at large.
6. Act for all such things which are ancillary or incidental to the attainment of all or any of the above-mentioned subjects, or which may be deemed conducive to the interests of the college.

B. NAAC ACCREDITATION

The National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore is an autonomous body set up by the UGC (University Grants Commission) in 1994 to develop quality in higher education i.e. College and University education in India. With this purpose a Peer Team consisting of three educational experts from various Universities visited Nabinchandra College on 20th and 21st August, 2004 and assessed the quality of the college. The college, as a result, has been accredited with Grade B. The NAAC accreditation is a very significant development in the history of this college.

As a post-accreditation quality development measure, the college constituted Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) to improve its higher education. Since quality improvement is a continuous process, the IQAC is a part of the system of this institution and is working towards realizing its goals of quality sustenance and enhancement. The first Co-ordinator of IQAC was Dr. Rajat Bhattacharya, former HOD of English, followed by Sri Soumitra Choudhury, Asstt. Professor in Economics, and at present Mr. Joynal Abedin Tafader, Asstt. Professor in Commerce is the Co-ordinator of the IQAC.

One positive benefit of the post-accreditation quality development measure for the college is the re-accreditation of the college by the NAAC with Grade B (CGPA 2.72). The reaccreditation came as a result of the NAAC Peer Team visit to the college that took place on January 31 and February 1, 2011. The NAAC PEER TEAM visited the college on 7th and 8th January 2019 for Third Cycle Accreditation and reaccredited the college with CGPA 1.94 under newly transited online accreditation system.

C. ISO 9001 CERTIFICATION

Nabinchandra College, Badarpur has been assessed by RAPL and certified ISO 9001 Quality Management Systems for providing the various courses of under graduate level for the streams of Arts, Commerce, Science and Vocational Course as well as Value Added Courses offered by the college.

D. ADMISSION

I. Admission Procedure:

a. Higher Secondary Courses in Arts, Commerce and Science (10+2):

Educational Qualification:

Candidates must have passed H.S.L.C. Examination or its equivalent under Government recognized Board. Any break in studies after passing H.S.L.C. or equivalent examination must be supported by a "GAP Certificate" issued as per specified proforma by an appropriate authority.

Admission Process:

A candidate interested to take admission in H.S 1st year course for the session 2024-25 shall have to undergo the following process.

- He/She shall have to apply in the **Darpan** admission portal of the Government of Assam and to select the institution of choice.
- Once selected for admission in NC. College, Badarpur in the Darpan portal he/she shall have to take online admission by visiting NC. College website after appearing before the Admission Board and observing all the admission formalities as and when announced by the college.

Subjects to be offered:

i) Compulsory Subjects for all streams:

English, MIL/Alternative. English, Environmental. Education

ii) Elective Subjects in Arts:

Economics, Political Science, History, Arabic, Advance Bengali

iii) Elective Subjects in Commerce :

Accountancy, Business Studies, Economics, Commercial Mathematics & Statistics

iv) Elective Subjects in Science :

Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Biology

b. FYUGP First Semester :

Educational Qualification:

Candidates must have passed H.S. Final Examination or its equivalent under Government recognized Board/Council.

Admission Process:

A candidate interested to take admission in Four Year Under Graduate Programme (FYUGP) under NEP 2020 for the session 2024-25 shall have to undergo the following process.

- He/She shall have to appear the Common University Entrance Test (CUET) conducted by the National Testing Agency (NTA) and shall have to submit CUET Marksheet along with H.S / equivalent Marksheet and other required documents.

- He/She shall have to apply in the **Samarth eGov** admission portal of the Government of Assam.

- Candidates interested to take admission in any of the FYUGP 1st Semester courses must visit the college website and submit online admission form uploading the scan copy of the print out copy of Samarth application form along with all the required particulars.

N.B: After completing the 1st phase of admission on the basis of merit and other reservation criteria taking into consideration the marks secured in H.S/equivalent examination & CUET, if any seat remains vacant, the college may give admission in the next phases to the candidates without CUET till the availability of seats subject to the approval of higher authorities.

III. COURSE STRUCTURE

a) Higher Secondary Courses

H.S. Arts (The First year / Second year)

Students of Arts stream will take the following subjects :

Compulsory Subjects :

- (i) English - 100 marks.
- (ii) Modern Indian Language / Alternative English - 100 marks.
- (iii) Environmental Education - 50 marks only in H.S. 1st year.

Elective Subjects :

- (i) Three elective subjects can be taken from the following :
(a) Economics (b) History (c) Political Science (d) Arabic (e) Advance Bengali - 100 marks each
- (ii) In addition to three elective subjects, a candidate may have the option to take fourth elective subject of 100 marks belonging to the same stream.

H.S. Commerce (The First year / Second year)

Students of the Commerce stream will take the following subjects :

Compulsory Subjects :

- (i) English - 100 marks.
- (ii) Modern Indian Language (MIL) / Alternative English - 100 marks.
- (iii) Environmental Education - 50 marks only in H.S. 1st year.

Elective Subjects :

- (i) Accountancy (ii) Business studies
- (iii) Economics and / or Commercial Mathematics & Statistics. (CMS)

* Students are advised to take both Economics and CMS as both the Subjects are important for higher studies.

H.S. Science (The First year / Second year)

Students of Science stream will take the following subjects :

Compulsory subjects :

- (i) English - 100 marks.
- (ii) Modern Indian Language (MIL) / Alternative English - 100 marks.
- (iii) Environmental Education - 50 marks only in H.S. 1st year.

Elective Subjects:

- (i) Physics (ii) Chemistry (iii) Mathematics and/ or Biology

N.B. * Students can opt for any one of the following languages as MIL: Assamese, Bengali, Bodo, Hindi, Nepali, Urdu, Khasi, Garo, Mizo and Manipuri.

****** The college teaches only one Modern Indian Language, that is, Bengali and Alt. English

Candidates offering MIL other than Bengali have to make their own arrangement for preparation in those subjects. It may be noted that a student cannot opt for both Advance Bengali and Arabic as elective subjects.

***** N.B :** AHSEC may change the course structure and the syllabus as and when required.

b) Four year Under Graduate Programme (FYUGP) under NEP 2020 :

New Education Policy (NEP) 2020 for UG Courses of colleges affiliated to Assam University Silchar, introduced w.e.f 2023-2024 :

i) UG curriculum for colleges affiliated to Assam University Silchar is a Four Year Under Graduate Programme (FYUGP) as per curriculum structure provided in Annexure-I. Students may take admission in FYUG by opting any of the Discipline Specific Core (DSC) courses offered by the college. Option for lateral exit after completion of one year/ two years/ three years of FYUGP will be given with Certificate/ Diploma/ Bachelor Degree in the Core Course under provision prescribed by Assam University, Silchar. Students opting for project/ dissertation in 4th year (in VIII semester) will be given Bachelor Degree in Honours with Research. However, students opting for additional three DSC courses in lieu of project/ dissertation will be given Bachelor Degree in Honours.

ii) Interdisciplinary courses shall have 04 baskets viz: Natural Sciences (NS). Social Sciences (SS). Humanities (HN) and Commerce & Management (CM). Students may opt for any one from those 04 baskets in each of I. II and III semester. Bunching of subjects in each basket shall be as per Annexure-II.

iii) From Discipline Specific Minor students shall take two subjects related to his / her Discipline. Each such subject should of 50% of total credit allotted to his course. Viz ; for Three Year UG programme each Discipline Specific Minor shall be of 13 credits and for Four Year UG programme each Discipline Specific Minor shall be of 17 credits. To be more precise, DSM-101(3), DSM-201(4), DSM-251 (3) and DSM-301 (3)-13 credits should be the first minor subjects in case of Three Year UG Programme (TYUG) and DSM-151 (3), DSM-252 (3), DSM-302 (3) and DSM-351(4)-13 should be second minor subject. For FYUG Programme DSM-401 (4) should be first minor subject and DSM-451 (4) should be second minor subject.

iv) Students securing highest CGPA (above 6.0) and with no back paper shall be allowed to change his/her core course once only, after completion of second semester, However, if a candidate desires to make one of his/her minors to core then automatic change in the minor should be done, as same subject cannot be opted as both core and minor. Also change of core may be allowed only within allied subjects.

v) 7.5 CGPA should be obtained by a student up to 3rd year for opting Honours with Research Degree in 4th year. However, for only Honours degree there shall not be any CGPA restriction. But students with arrear paper not be allowed to move to 4th year in any case.

vi) Evaluation of 3 and 4 credit course shall be out of 100 marks and that for 2 credit course shall be out of 50 marks.

vii) IDC courses opted shall remain same for all three semesters. Semester wise change of IDC is not allowed.

viii) For AEC courses, there shall not be any internal exam. Total Marks for AEC examination shall be 50 with two hours examination duration.

ix) SEC shall have to be opted from either DSC or DSM. Evaluation method for SEC for Science stream shall be 50 (End Semester Theory)+30 (End Sem Practical/Project/Field work) + 20 (internal test of which 14 for test and 6 for attendance). The same for Arts and commerce shall be 50 (End Semester Theory)+20 (End Semester Prac-

- tical/Project/Field work) + 30 (internal test of which 20 for test and 10 for attendance).
- x) For EVS (VAC-151) evaluation method shall be 70 (End Semester exam) + 30 Internal/Assignment. Marks for Internal test shall again be divided to 20 for written test and 10 for attendance.
- xi) Evaluation method for VAC-101 (with practical) shall be same as that of SEC (with practical) and that of VAC-101 (Without practical) shall be same as VAC-151.
- xii) EVS in VAC-151 should be of 100 level and EVS included in Natural Science Basket as IDC should be of 200 level.
- xiii) Publication / Presentation of papers out of Research Project / Dissertation carried out in VIII semester is not mandatory. However, the project shall have to be presented before Departmental Research Committee and in presence of an external examiner during end semester examination. Total marks for the project shall be 300 of which 90 shall be internal and 210 is for end semester examination. Out of 90 marks as internal, in case of Dissertation/ Project, there shall be three progress reviews and each review shall be of 30 marks. Marks obtained by a student in each of the review shall be notified immediately. Review of progress shall be done by concerned supervisor in presence of Departmental Research Committee.
- xiv) For all other courses evaluation method shall be of 70 marks (for End Semester Examination) and 30 marks (for Internal Examination). Marks for Internal test shall again be divided to 20 for written test and 10 for attendance.
- xv) Natural Science in IDC. shall not have any practical component.
- xvi) For Subject with practical's DSC-152. DSC-253, DSC-303, DSC-354 and DSC-404 shall be practical with 100 marks. Practical examination shall be held in presence of External Examiner.
- xvii) For Subject with practical DSM-251 shall be practical for first minor and DSM-351 shall be practical for second minor. Marks for practical examination shall be 100 each and examination shall be held in presence of External Examiner.
- xviii) For VAC 151 (EVS). shall not have any practical component.
- xix) For opting DSC and DSM combination, clustering of subjects shall be as per ANNEXURE-III. DSC from one cluster and DSM from other cluster is not allowed. DSC. DSM and IDC cannot be the same subject.
- xx) All DSM courses shall be stand alone and student can select first minor subject and second minor subject according to their choice keeping total requirement of 17 credit for each minor but they can not change the code of minor papers, viz. one student of Physics (Core) may have Chemistry as first minor in DSM 101 and Mathematics as second minor in DSM 151. But the other student of physics (core) may have Mathematics as first minor in DSM-101 and Chemistry as second minor in DSM 151.
- xxi) For Research with Honours students. DSC-451 paper shall be research methodology and content of this course shall be same across the subjects and across the disciplines. However for other students DSC 451 will be a usual 500 level paper.
- xxii) Any student interested to opt for Honours with Research should have 7.5 CGPA up to third year without any arrear.
- xxiii) In lieu of MIL, Alternative English may be opted by a student.

Step 1. For each course, marks secured by a student in ESE (including CCA, if any) will be converted to Grade Point (GP) on the basis of 10 -point Grading Scale as per the following formula.

College Examinations :

Students will have to appear at all examinations that may be conducted by the college for HS/TDC and B.Voc Courses.

H. DRESS CODE

- Uniform must be of the specified colour.**
- Low-waist pant and tight dress will not be allowed**
- Shoes / Sandals / Belts must be either black or Brown.**

I. GENERAL DISCIPLINE

- Students must come and leave the college on time.
- Students must not loiter in the veranda and cause disturbance to teachers and students in the classroom. They must spend their off periods productively in the reading room or in their respective common rooms.
- Students must wear proper uniform in the college.
- Students must show respect to and behave politely with the principal, the teachers and the other staff of the college.
- Students must maintain the sanctity of the classroom, examination hall and the library.
- Smoking, chewing betel leaf and such other activities by students are strictly prohibited in the college campus.
- Tuition fee and other fees must be cleared before the time fixed for the purpose.
- No one except the officers on duty and the present staff and students of this college is allowed to enter the classroom without the permission of the college authority. If any student of this college entertains such people he/she will be liable to disciplinary action.
- Any damage caused to college property (furniture, doors and windows, library books, equipment, sports materials etc.) must be compensated by the concerned student.
- Students are required to submit a clearance certificate to the effect that no dues are outstanding against library books, sports materials, returnable NCC uniform items etc., failing which they will be debarred from the council / university examinations OR they might face any other disciplinary action.
- Students are entirely responsible for their behaviour in the college campus and outside when they are deputed by the college to participate in any programme.
- Use of **mobile phones** in any manner is strictly prohibited inside the college campus.
- Ragging in any form is a punishable offence (according to Supreme Court of India)
- Bi-cycles and Motor Cycles are to be parked only in the specified areas.
- Library Reading Room should be used strictly for reading purpose. Any sort of gossiping is strictly prohibited in the Reading Room.
- College Campus must not be made dirty by spitting or any other means. Students are required to strictly abide by the rules and regulations as prescribed by the college authorities for the smooth and peaceful functioning of the college.

All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action in relation to the students of the college are vested in the

discipline Committee headed by the Principal. The Principal may delegate any of his powers to such other person(s) as he may nominate for this purpose. Violation of the rules, unsatisfactory progress, irregular attendance, discourtesy shown to the principal, teachers and other staff members in any form, adoption of unfair means in the examinations, and causing damage to college property are some of the offences which may make a student liable to disciplinary action in such forms as imposition of fine, forced transfer and even expulsion from the college.

J. : RAGGING FREE CAMPUS

Ragging includes (i) any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the affect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness to any student, including in rowdy or indiscipline activities which cause or likely to cause annoyance, hardship, psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physical and mental condition of a fresher or a junior student.

(ii) Any act of physical or mental abuse (including bullying and exclusion) targeted at another student (fresher or otherwise) on the ground of colour, race, religion, caste, ethnicity, gender including transgender), sexual orientation appearance, nationality, regional origins, linguistic identity, place of birth, place of residence or economic backgrounds.

(iii) Extortion in any form of a newly admitted student by the senior.

K. FACILITIES

1. LIBRARY

The college has a well-improvised library with a good collection of books covering a wide variety of subjects. Library facilities include provision of reading rooms for students and teachers, newspaper-stand, lending of books and other library materials. The library subscribes to a number of periodicals including different subject magazines and 3 to 4 newspapers (National & Local). It also stocks magazines, question papers and information booklets.

Library cards are issued to students to enable them borrow books and other library materials. They can avail library service from 11.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m. on all working days. A student is allowed to borrow two books at a time for 10 days. Honours students enjoy better borrowing facilities. Students can make use of the reading room which remains open from 11.00 a.m. to 4.00 p.m. for reading books and journals, making notes, reading newspapers etc. The college library is now computerized with standard software provided free by the INFLIBNET centre, Ahmedabad with financial assistance from the UGC. The Library is the member of National Digital Library, IIT. Khargapur. This will help the users access to lakhs of E-Books and E-Journals and also other important documents.

The Library Committee, constituted as per relevant rules, with the principal as chairman and librarian as secretary devises steps and schemes based on recommendations emerging from its meeting for smooth functioning of the library and promotion of library facilities.

2. UGC NETWORK RESOURCE CENTRE :

The students and staff of this college can avail the internet facility in the centre for academic purposes.

3. GAMES AND SPORTS :

Nabinchandra College offers facilities for cricket, football, volleyball, badminton, carrom, chess etc. The college has its own playground in front of the college building in which the annual sports are held. Many more facilities are being procured.

4. BOOK-BANK :

The College has started a Book-Bank from where needy students may be supplied with books

5. COLLEGE MAGAZINE :

To enable the students publish their creative writings, a college magazine "Nabinjyoti" is brought out annually. Departmental journals will be brought out to encourage creative/critical writings among the students.

6. CANTEEN :

The college has canteen facility for refreshment of Students & Teachers.

7. GYMNASIUM :

A Yoga and Gymnasium centre has been opened in the college in the year 2006 with a qualified instructor to promote physical and mental wellbeing of the students. A student can use the services of the centre with a payment of Rs. 80.00 for one year. Students and employees willing to use the centre for Yoga and Gym training may contact the instructor.

8. CAREER & COUNSELLING CELL :

The Co-ordinator and Convener of the Cell is Mr. Bazlur Rahman Khan, Assistant Professor, Deptt. of History. The Cell regularly organizes counseling programmes in different areas of academic, professional and vocational studies. It also provides counseling to students for competitive examinations like Civil Service Examinations and important entrance tests such as CAT for MBA aspirants, etc.

The Career & Counseling Cell has its own library enriched with sorts of books, journals and magazines for competitive and entrance examinations. Further, the cell has also a well sophisticated class room with facilities like projector, audio system. The cell has one Office Assistant name Shamsul Islam on the part time basis. Besides, the Career & Counseling Cell presently running important UGC Schemes & Programmes.

9. COACHING CLASSES FOR ENTRY IN SERVICES : Under this scheme, the Career & Counseling Cell organized special coaching classes for different competitive exams such as UPSC Civil Service Examination (IAS), APSC Assam Civil Service, Teachers Eligibility (TET), IBPS Officers & Clerical, etc.

10. EQUAL OPPORTUNITY CENTRE : To promote the educational standard of students belonged to marginalized community Short Term Courses - (i) Personality 'Development & Computer Literacy, (ii) Spoken & Written English are organized in the college.

11. REMEDIAL COACHING CLASSES : Special classes are organized for the students of SC/ST/OBC/ Minority & Economically backward communities with special emphasis on the knowledge of concerned subjects and functional languages in the off hours.

12. PRIZES AND SCHOLARSHIPS :

Two cash prizes and certificates in the name and style of Late Mahmoda Begum Memorial Prizes are given to the highest mark holders in both H.S. and Degree (Hons.) examinations.

A scholarship in the name and style of Doreen Scholarship has been launched in 2005-2006 academic session for two top scorers of this college (in both general and female categories) in the H.S. examination every year in the following subjects : English, Bengali, Political Science and Economics.

Also, a scholarship in memory of freedom fighter Late Md. Gaazi Sikender Ahmed is awarded to the highest scorer in H.S. Final Exam. with Arabic as a combination and to the highest scorer in Arabic Honours in TDC 1st Sem. Examination.

Another scholarship in the memory of Late Md. Gazi Tufail Ahmed is awarded to any place holder in both H.S. and Degree examinations. This has been introduced with effect from session 2012-13

The College has also introduced one more award in the name and style of N.C. College Award of Excellence which is given to the rank holders in H.S. / Degree final examinations.

13. HEALTH CENTRE :

A health centre has been set up with facilities like first-aid and periodic health check-up for the students and other members of the college community. Dr. Swapan Das, M.B.B.S., consultant physician, has signed a MOU with the college authorities to provide support to the centre. Dr. Debangshu Banerjee, M.D. (Hom) has also been Voluntarily offering services on every Saturday.

14. AUDITORIUM :

The College has a large well-furnished sound proof auditorium for different function of the college.

15. OVERHEAD PROJECTOR :

The college owns an overhead projector. The projector will be a very useful aid in the conduct of different meetings, seminars, workshops etc. in the college.

16. SOUND SYSTEM :

The college has sound systems in all the large classrooms.

17. DRINKING WATER:

The college has installed a drinking water system in its campus for providing drinking water to the students and the staff. The system has been installed with financial assistance from Barak Valley Cements Ltd., Badarpur.

18. GENERATOR :

The college has recently installed a high powered generator to ensure uninterrupted power supply in view of frequent power cuts.

19. DEPARTMENTAL LIBRARY : The college has provided departmental Libraries which are under the supervision of the Head of the different departments.

L. STUDENT SUPPORT SERVICES

1. NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC):

The college has a unit of NCC which has been operating since 1988 under 4 Assam Battalion NCC, Karimganj. Besides regular classes and parades of NCC there are occasional camps like Combined Annual Training Camp (CATC), National Integration Camp (NIC), Basic Leadership Camp (BLC), Advance Leadership Camp (ALC) Army Attachment Camp (AAC), EK Bharat Shreshtha Bharat (EBSB), Trekking Camps etc notified from time to time by the office. The unit undertakes several activities like Plantation, Blood Donation, Swachh Abhiyaan, Disaster Management Programme, Yoga, Awareness Programmes on Health, Pollution, and on several Social Issues time to time.

Every year at the beginning of the academic session, the unit enroll cadets from the newly admitted students. Admission process includes Written Test, Physical Test, and Interview. Students having NCC - 'A' Certificate are preferred for admission in NCC. Total strength of cadets in the college unit is 160. Present enrollment fee is Rs. 19 for NCC first year cadets. Cadet gets money for refreshment in their personal bank account at Rs. 45 per NCC class attended. The cadet also get free NCC uniform. 75% attendance in NCC class is a must to participate in any camp and to sit in NCC 'B' & 'C' Certificate Examinations. **Lt. Dr. Sorwar Alam Khan**, Assistant Professor of Economics is the N.C.C officer (ANO) of the college unit.

2. NSS : The College has an active NSS unit. **Bazlur Rahman Khan**, Assistant Professor, Dept. of History is the programme officer. Interested students can register themselves as members in consultation with the programme officer.

3. SCOUTS AND GUIDE : The College has introduced Scout and Guide Service from this session. The teacher incharge of this service is Dr. Pallab Deb.

4. CELL FOR COMMUNITY ORIENTATION AND EXTENSION PROGRAMME : This cell with Dr. Fazlur Rahman Laskar as its convenor, will identify the problems and difficulties of the people living around the college and reach out to them by offering socially useful services. Health care and literacy camps are some of its important concerns. Other socially useful activities are also under consideration.

5. STUDENTS UNION : The College authority welcomes Students' Union in the college to be formed as per the constitution of the Nabinchandra College Students' Union. The Students' Union activities aim at developing leadership qualities and healthy competition among the students of the college. The Election of Student's Union is generally held before Puja Vacation.

6. GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL CELL : This Cell deal with the grievances that may be there among the students and takes necessary steps to redress the grievances.

7. GAMES & SPORTS CELL : This cell looks after and guide the students in all matters related to the events of sports of the college as well as inter-college.

8. CULTURAL CELL : This cell looks after, guide and organize the students to hold different cultural events of the college as well as inter-college which include quiz and debate also.

9. CELL AGAINST SEXUAL HARASSMENT : This cell takes cognisance of any kind of sexual harassment in the college both among the students & employees and takes necessary action.

10. RESEARCH CELL : The functions of this cell are to improve the research culture among the faculties as well as the students of the college. Multi-Disciplinary Annual Research Journal "Edusearch" with ISSN 2395-7298. is regularly brought out by this cell.

11. DISCIPLINE COMMITTEE : The functions of this committee are to look after the discipline of the college, to adopt measures to prevent indiscipline and to improve discipline in the college, and also to take action if and when requires against the cases of indiscipline.

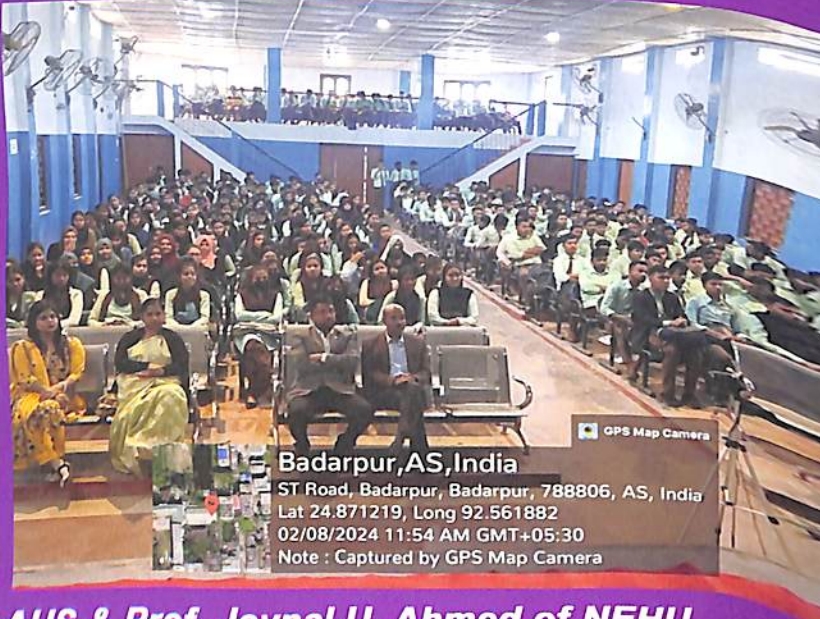
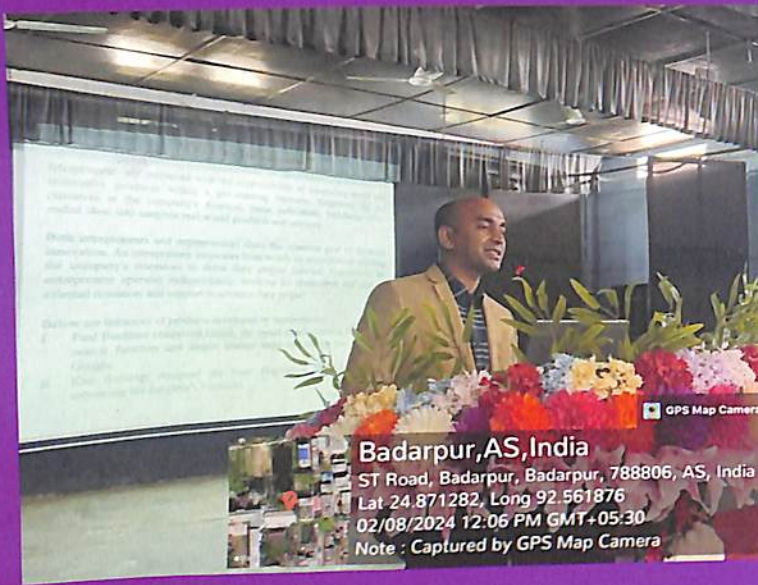
